



Feeding Futures - Nechako Lakes: November Update

Dear Parent/Guardian,

As we roll into November, Feeding Futures – Nechako Lakes is excited to share the growing amount of locally produced food being used in school food programs. What is more exciting is there are multiple organizations throughout Northern BC working on projects to improve the food system.

Last week, School District 91 staff attended the Northern Harvest:

Seeing Sustainable Futures Through Food and Collaboration in Prince George.

Presentations from keynotes highlighted the unique opportunities that exist in Northern BC.

Projects currently happening throughout Northern BC, including three with School District
91, showed innovation from many groups working to improve the food system. It was an exciting few days of celebrating the Northern food system, with energy developed for the various projects unfolding in the year ahead!



In Focus - Feeding Futures Guiding Principle

Feeding Futures has five guiding principles.

Each newsletter will focus on one. The focus this time is:

"Programs support BC foods to grow local communities, economies and food system resilience."

 Babine Elementary-Secondary School had a successful growing season with new garden beds funded by an Imagine Grant and Whole Kids grant. Potatoes and carrots have been harvested, and are being used in the daily lunch program.



- Decker Lake is getting ready to use a new hydroponic growing wall to grow lettuce, kale and herbs. This is part of funding from a Farm2Cafeteria Canada grant.
- Fraser Lake Elementary-Secondary School and Mouse Mountain started purchasing beef from Copper T Ranch. The locally raised beef and sausages have been used in various meals since September, and will continue with more beef being bought this month.
- In September, Nechako Valley Secondary School made a harvest soup for lunch.
 This soup featured local, seasonal produce of squash, carrots and potatoes from Felicity and Borno farms.
- The beef being served for lunch at WL McLeod, Evelyn Dickson and Sinkut View comes from a kindly donated 4H cow. Thank you!



The school meal worker at Fort St James Secondary
 School made 300 meatballs using lovely Reimer Ranch beef and served it as sweet&sour meatballs with chow mein noodles. The meal was a hit with the students!

Other Items

 Schools are always looking for new recipes and meal ideas. If you have one, please share.

Did you know? The school district is working with local food producers and processors such as: Bakkerij Lobelle, Reimer's Ranch, Brophy Ranch, Speckled Sow, Copper T Ranch, Felicity Farms, and Borno Farms. Conversations are ongoing to start working with more local producers as connections are made.

Comments heard throughout the school district:

"I wish a program like this existed when I was in school. It is so important to have food to be ready to learn."

"Mr. K can I PLEASEEEEE have a carrot out of the garden?!"

"The students are loving the food, it just flies."
